Sentence Translation Steps: Latin to English

- 1. First go through the Latin sentence word by word and write an analysis of each word.
- 2. Identify what Latin word in the vocabulary (with all of the parts listed there) each word in the sentence comes from.
- **3.** Identify the part of speech.
- 4. If it is a noun or an adjective, identify the gender, number, and case. If it is a noun, identify the role it has in the sentence. If it is an adjective, determine what noun it modifies (for an adjective to modify a noun, it must agree with it in gender, number, and case, and it must be next to it).
- 5. If the word is a verb, identify what conjugation it belongs to, then identify what particular form of the verb it is (person, number, tense, mood, and voice).
- 6. If the word is a preposition, then identify what case its object needs to be in. Figure out which word in the sentence is its object (an object of a preposition will always come after the preposition in the sentence, usually right after).
- 7. If the word is a conjunction, then identify what words, phrases, clauses, or sentences the conjunction connects.
- **8.** If the word is an adverb, then determine what the adverb modifies (a verb, an adjective, or another adverb).
- 9. Translate each individual word based on the above analysis of it.
- **10.** Determine which of the four English sentence templates (See "Basic English Sentence Templates" file) you need to use for this sentence. (If the verb is a linking verb, then you will use the 1st or 2nd template. If the verb is an action verb, then you will use the 3rd or 4th template.)
- **11.** Put all the words in the correct order according to the template.
- **12.** Translate the sentence into English all together.
